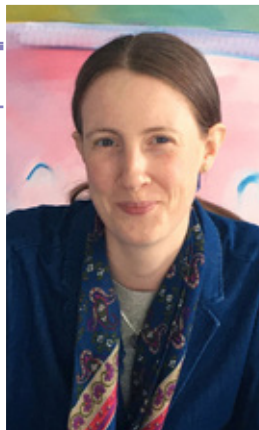

Alyson Davies, our critic

ALYSON DAVIES is a visual artist based in Edmonton, Alberta (*amiskwaciwâskahikan, Treaty 6 Territory*). In the studio Davies studies moments of connection with nature intertwined with personal histories and autobiographic storytelling. Her multidisciplinary studio practice primarily focuses on painting, and ceramics but extends into printmaking, and textiles.

She holds a MFA from Emily Carr University of Art and Design and BFA from the University of Alberta. Her artwork has been shown across Canada and the United States.

SERAYA SMIT

This is a beautiful image with gorgeous buttery colours. There's a translucency in many of the transitions, and several smooth moments that transport the viewer through this scene. Suggest toning down the high-lights (strong blue against the yellow) as they seem a bit intense.



ELAINE TSURUDA

There's a 'wowness' to this acrylic and alcohol ink scene. The textures and dimensionality, through the pointillism technique are well done, and the 'two visual languages' work well together (land and sky). Beautiful colour palette.



ROB GUETRE

This floral done in oils is effectively rendered. There's a lovely sense of atmosphere. Perhaps it could use a few more high and low tones, with deeper tones in the background to ground it more.



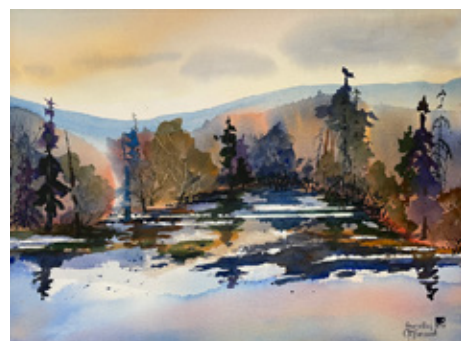
MARY FRANCES FITZGERALD

The colours work well together, even with the challenges of metallic paint which draws the eye. The sgraffito is alluring. Try for more collage elements to enhance the piece. The composition could be lightened a bit with less metallic paint.



KEITH NUNAS

This urban street scene has harmonious and velvety colours and values. The understated rendering of the human figures is effective as they don't distract. Perhaps the white reflections on some of the windows might be too prominent?



GAIL FAREWELL

Nice atmospheric quality, confident brushwork and harmonious colours. Work on the sky to match the intensity of the reflections. Perhaps the clouds could be less globular?



JOHANNE SEPTOU

A very fun abstract with a mandala vibe. The metallic paint in all but the black and white is effective. A brush to make marks may be more effective than a pen which is hard to control on canvas. The movement is exciting, and it would be amazing to see a series of these.



MARIA HOLOWINSKY

A playful piece, well done with the variety of materials used. To finish, consider more collage / bubble wrap textures, etc in the background and edges. Confident brushstrokes on the gnome, continue that with a few highlights.



RICHARD ST AMANT

The fluid dynamic brushstrokes and colours bring this watercolour / acrylic landscape to life. Nice colour palette, but you may want to mix your own purples. Consider taking the next painting right to the edges of the canvas. Nice whimsical feel to this piece.



CASSANDRA CHENG

This watercolour works well with its harmonious palette. I like the sense of movement and spontaneity, especially in the water. Suggest enhancing the light / dark contrast.



BARB STACHOW

This chalk pastel / coloured pencil piece is beautifully done. The subtle rendering of the feathers shows confident skill. You might consider enhancing the delicate details here with a few more highlights. Perhaps there is too much background space and it could be cropped to focus more on the bird.



MEHAR KAUR

This still-life (executed with a palette knife) has a strong confident composition. The yellow highlights work well amidst the layers or 'history' done with the darks. Perhaps there is a bit too much background. Suggest using a brush along with the knife to add more shadow tones.



RUTH BAILEY

This is a beautifully detailed image. Lovely subtle colour choices and an excellent colour choice for the background. Consider working a little more on the 'hairs' of the corn husks, and pushing back the shadows.



DEBRA LONG

This translucent poppy is a calming piece. There are beautiful shifts of light and dark, with the many tints and shades on the petals creating a velvety luminescence. Consider defining the edges of some petals to add even more depth. Very satisfying details / mastery of watercolours.



CHERYL JOHNSON

There is a moody ambience in this rainy day landscape. The trees, puddles and foliage are subtle and soothing. Suggest enhancing the contrast with in general and, in particular, brighter highlights in the puddles. Where is the light coming from? Could consider a series of these.



JANI GALARNEAU

This large epoxy sculpture and painting of a lemur stands out; it's life-like, whimsical and dramatic. The choice in the floral print is effective and works well with the foliage background. Could there be a little more 3-D dimension to the lemur's face?



JAMES TORDIFF

A gorgeous engraving, with an intriguing composition. There's a frenetic energy in the subject and its environment. Perhaps a little more hand-rendering of the texture. This would certainly be successful as a bigger piece.



DONNA CHAMBERLAND

This watercolour is well crafted; you show confidence in your brushwork. Watercolour is a challenging medium, and though the background colour choice is excellent, it might benefit from more textural strokes.



PENNY LAMNEK

A lovely fun piece. One is drawn to the 'ghosts' of some branches and there's good depth in the blues. While it is a harmonious composition, perhaps it is a bit heavy to one side; a thought for next time. The edges integrate with the branches effectively.



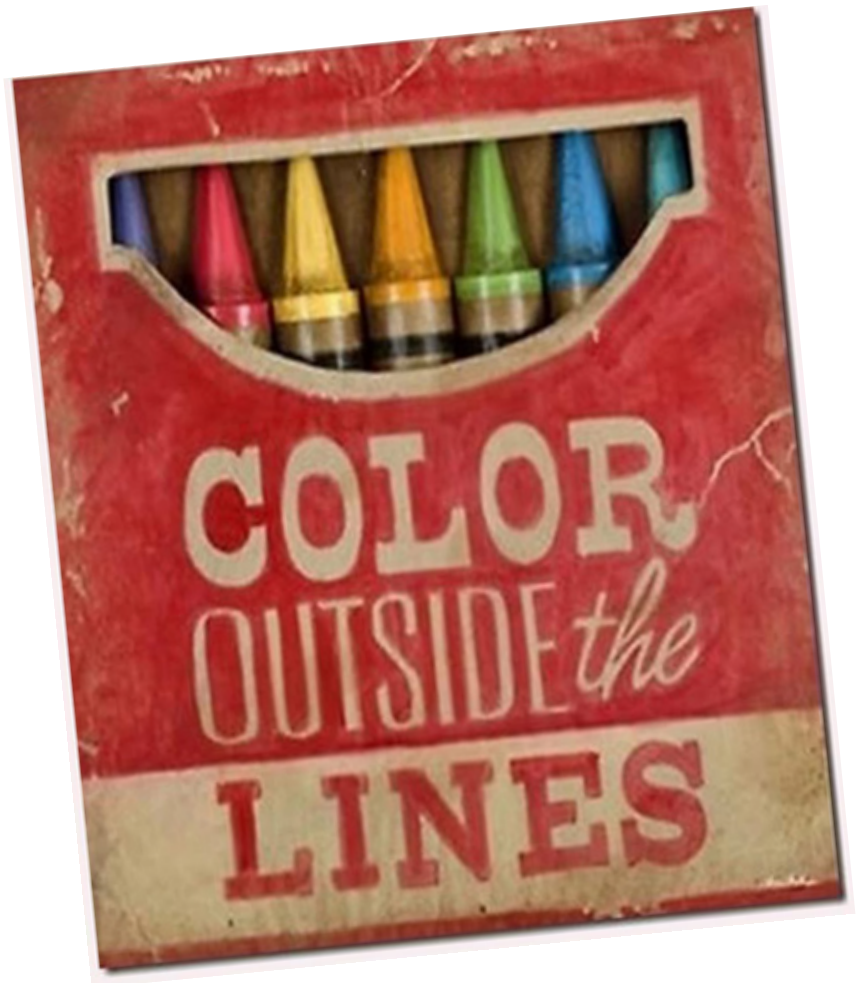
KEVIN BIGELOW

A fun piece with an "urban street art" feel. The viewer is drawn to the abstraction of the background; its texture and pattern. Consider bringing some of that abstraction into the fox, as well. The shadow of the fox could use a little more work.

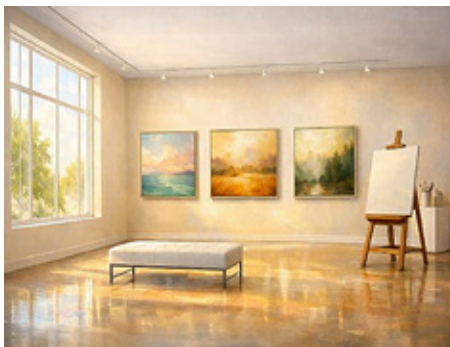


The Privilege of Being Seen: The Importance of Exhibiting Our Work

An overview and perspective

Where Our Work Meets the World

EXHIBITING ARTWORK is one of the most profound privileges we share as artists.

It is the moment when our private creative journeys step into the public sphere—when the quiet hours spent shaping colour, form, and intention finally meet the eyes and hearts of others.

For the Edmonton Art Club, this act of showing our work is more than tradition; it is a living expression of who we are as a community.

Each exhibition becomes a bridge between our members and the wider world, strengthening our presence within Alberta's vibrant arts landscape.

There is a quiet moment—just before an exhibition opens—when the gallery lights settle, the room stills, and our paintings seem to breathe on their own.

It is in this moment that the privilege of exhibiting becomes unmistakable.

Our work stands beside the work of our peers, speaking in harmony and contrast, revealing the depth and diversity of our collective voice.

To exhibit is to step forward not only as individual artists, but as a community that believes in the power of creativity to shape culture, spark connection, and leave a meaningful imprint on the world around us.

The Threshold for New Members

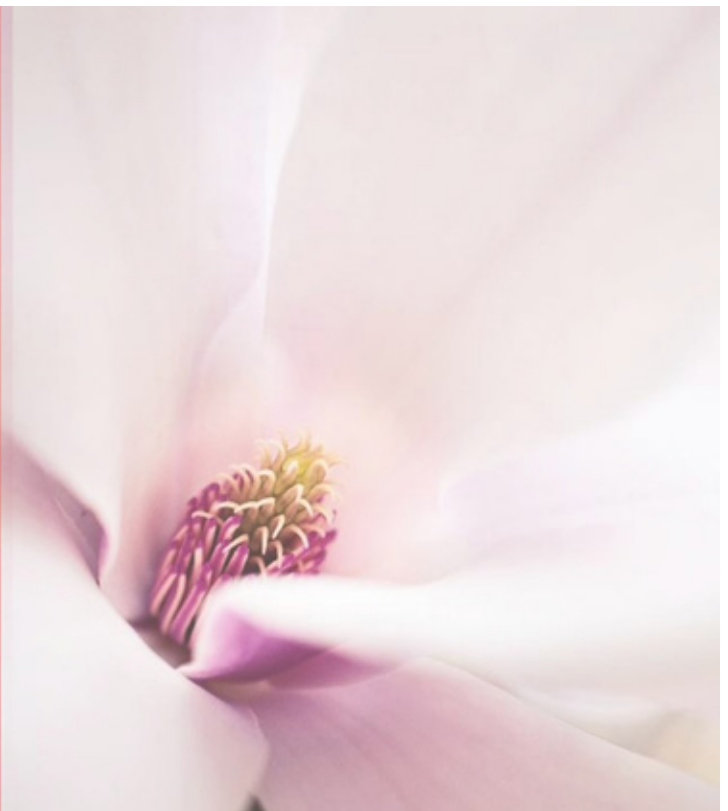

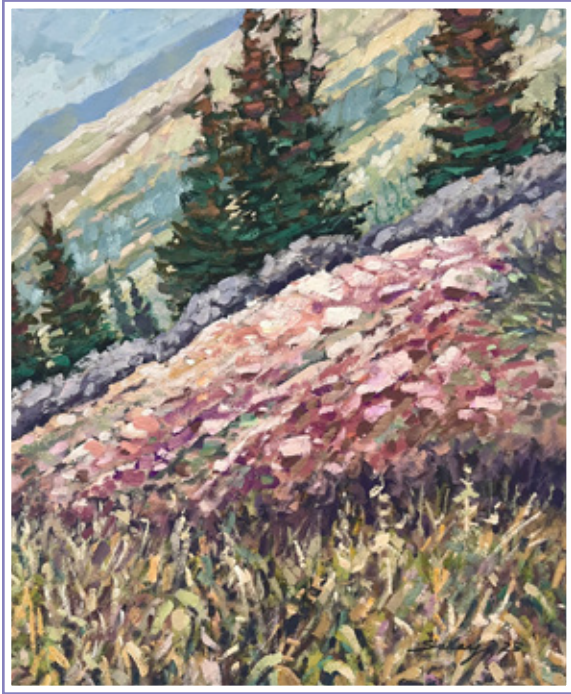

PERSPECTIVE & COMPOSITION

M.Salayi

THERE ARE MANY CRUCIAL ELEMENTS that an artist should consider in any painting, and composition is one of the most important. Composition includes the viewing angle and perspective. Choosing a strong angle attracts the viewer into the depth of the painting and adds extra power to the subject.



Personally, I give a great deal of attention to this aspect. I always try to avoid flat, wide scenes, and instead strive to guide the viewer's eyes through the depth of the painting.



This is important no matter what medium you use, and it has always been recommended by the masters as a key to creating a masterpiece. A strong composition adds vitality and movement to a painting, allowing the viewer's



eyes to travel throughout the entire piece without losing the focal points. Most importantly, it creates a more engaging and enjoyable experience that keeps the viewer from getting bored.

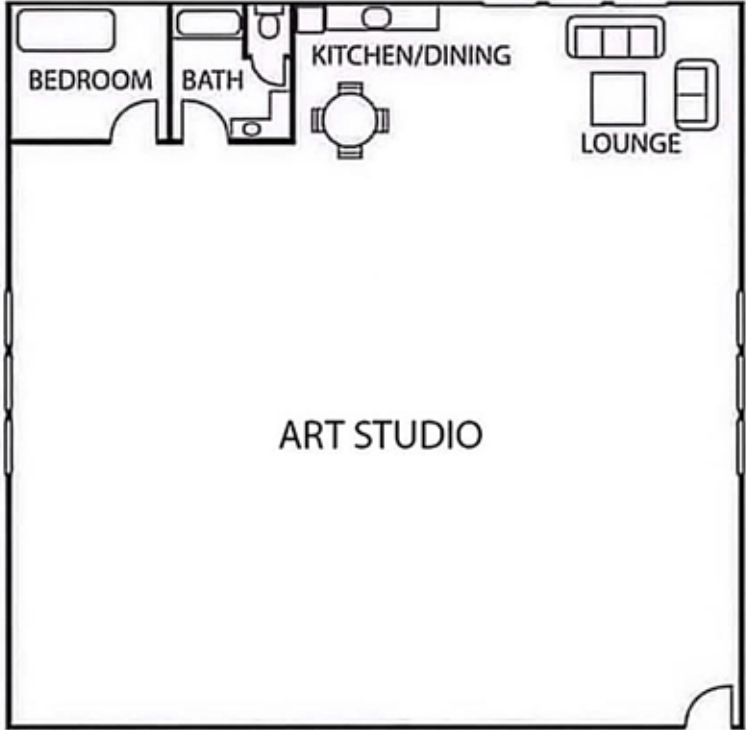
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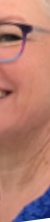

Did you know that the Edmonton Art Club is a member of Alberta's wider art community and is part of the Alberta Community Art Clubs Association?

The Alberta Community Art Clubs Association (ACACA) hosts three Regional Zone Shows (Northern, Central, and Southern) each spring. For 2026, the registration deadline for all entries was April 15, 2026.

The confirmed dates and locations for the 2026 ACACA Zone Shows include:

Northern Zone Show - June 4 – 6, 2026

Location: Hinton Municipal Library

Host: Hinton Art Club

Central & Southern Zone Shows

Dates & Locations: Spring dates vary depending on local community art clubs.

For confirmed regional venues and host conditions, check the full ACACA 2026 Zone Shows Schedule or review the updates in the ACACA Facebook Group.

Zone shows are followed by the *Alberta Wide Show*. The levels of entry (Youth, Beginner, Intermediate, Advanced, Master, and Signature) are offered in each of the five art categories: Two-Dimensional, Sculpture, Digital Illustration, Digital Manipulation, and Fiber Art.

Each show has three adjudicators, and awards are given, followed by a group critique.

PERK: Any club that joins the ACACA is able to post advertisements or an article in our Newsletter, Facebook and Instagram.
